ECCT Poetry Spotlight

Did you know that the Episcopal Church in CT (ECCT) has a poetry network? There are over two dozen different Ministry Networks run by ECCT from Climate and Environment Stewardship to Episcopal Church Women to Hispanic Ministry. The Poetry Ministry is a ministry of people who create poetry and gather to share it with others. Also at some churches on Poetry Sundays, poets weave poetic responses to the propers for the day into the Eucharist. This practice started at St. Mark's in New Britain. The ministry network email is episcopalct.poetry@gmail.com and the primary contact is Dr. Barbara A. Campbell who was named the first official "Diocesan Poet". Here is one of her poems.

The Remnant by Barbara A. Campbell

**November Shines at
the Met**

This November promises to be an exciting month for new productions. On November 9 is the world premiere of Puccini's *Madama Butterfly* which is one of my all time favorites. This three-act Italian opera first premiered in Milan in 1904. The Italian libretto tells the story of the doomed love of a Japanese woman ("Butterfly") for a US naval officer who marries and deserts her. The narrative is based on the 1898 short story "Madame Butterfly" by John Luther Long, which itself was based on the 1887 semi-autobiographical novel *Madame Chrysanthème* by French writer Pierre Loti. Puccini wrote five versions of the opera, which was originally in two acts, not three. The fifth version, completed in 1907, is considered the standard for performances.

On November 23, the premiere of Philip Glass's *Akhnaten* will be performed. Year One of Akhnaten's reign begins with the funeral of Amenhotep III. We see him first revealed both as a corpse and as a ghostly figure, reciting words taken from the Egyptian Book of the Dead. During the ceremony we see a sacred ritual performed in which the body's organs are carefully taken out and placed into canopic jars and the body is wrapped and embalmed. There is also a scene in which the Pharaoh's heart is weighed against a feather; if his heart is as light as this it will ensure that Amenhotep will travel through into the afterlife.

So if you can, try not to miss these world premieres. Be sure to check your local listings at your local theatres in the upcoming months as well.

Thanksgiving Thoughts
