### **Annual Meeting**

The Annual Meeting will be held Sunday, Jan 24, 2021 via Zoom at 10:00 a.m. following the 9:00 a.m. service. We strongly encourage everyone to attend in order to hear the year-end summary of our church's status and participate in elections for next year. This is also when the church approves the 2021 budget.

The current Vestry is comprised of four officers - Senior Warden (Worship), Junior Warden (Building & Grounds), Treasurer, and Clerk (with one year terms). Then there are six at-large positions (with three year terms and two coming off each year).

Due to our smaller congregation size, the Vestry is proposing a change to the bylaws to reduce the at-large positions from six to five. This proposal will be voted on by the parish at the Annual Meeting.

# 2020 Outreach and Mission

Christ and The Epiphany is committed to both local outreach and global mission.

Local outreach is done with the money collected in the change jars located in the church and chapel. For 2020 a donation of \$200 has been made to Life Haven. Life Haven provides a temporary shelter to homeless pregnant women and women with young children in New Haven.

On the first Sunday of each month a separate collection is taken for Global Mission. For 2020 the Vestry allocated this money to the two projects we have been supporting the last few years.

\$1,250 went to Kateri Medical Services which provides medical care for poor people in Nigeria.

\$1,250 went to SAMS/Women of Madagascar. The Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders (SAMS) does work around the world. We are committed to helping the women of Madagascar.

Next Meeting - The next Vestry meeting will be Sunday, January 17th via Zoom after the 9:00 a.m. service.

Worship - Zoom interview with priest-in-charge candidate will be scheduled. Goal for 2021 is to have three Sundays a month with a priest. We appear to have four parishioners willing to give reflections so once a month we will have parishioners and any other Sundays we will use recorded sermons. Once ECCT has established licenses for Lay Worship Leaders for Morning

Prayer we will make sure we have at least two licensed people. (At least six people have expressed interest.)

Building & Grounds - The boiler requires some maintenance work. Also we need to find a new contractor for lawn work and snow removal. Our current contractor is in ill health and unable to continue.

### Episcopalians...

#### **Garrison Keillor**

We make fun of Episcopalians for their blandness, excessive calm, fear of giving offense, lack of speed and secret fondness for macaroni and cheese. But nobody sings like them. If you were asked an audience in Des Moines, a relatively Episcopalianless place, to sing along on the chorus of "Michael Row the Boat Ashore", they will look daggers at you as if you had asked them to strip to their underwear. But if you do this among Episcopalians, they will smile and row that boat ashore and up on the beach!

It's natural for Episcopalians to sing in harmony. We are too modest to be soloists, too worldly to sing in unison. By our joining in harmony, we somehow promise that we will not forsake each other. I do believe this: Episcopalians, who love to sing in four-part harmony are the sort of people you could call up when you're in deep distress. If you are dying, they will comfort you. If you are lonely, they'll talk to you. And if you are hungry, they'll give you tuna salad!

Episcopalians believe in prayer, but would practically die if asked to pray out loud. Episcopalians like to sing, except when confronted with a new hymn or a hymn with more than four stanzas. Episcopalians believe their Rectors will visit them in the hospital, even if they don't notify them that they are there. Episcopalians usually follow the official liturgy and will feel it is their way of suffering for their sins. Episcopalians believe in miracles and even expect miracles, especially during their stewardship visitation programs or when passing the plate. Episcopalians feel that applauding for their children's choirs will not make the kids too proud and conceited. Episcopalians drink coffee as if it were the Third Sacrament. Episcopalians feel guilty for not staying to clean up after their own wedding reception in the Fellowship Hall. Episcopalians still serve Jell-O in the proper liturgical color of the season and Episcopalians believe that it is OK to poke fun at themselves and never take themselves too seriously.

If it were up to me I would have kept going; tucking away the rough edges of my soul, afraid that if God sees all, maybe this time is the time I've become a disappointment to Him. So I hid assuming I could un-earn a grace I never did or could earn. I kept going living life in the fast lane, afraid of my inability to ever hit the gas pedal again once I chose the break.

If it were up to me I would have kept going, but thankfully it wasn't.

For the God who so loved the world and me hit the pause, turning our expectations into uncertainty and our going into staying at home.

Bunkered down at last there was space to take inventory of the fragile soul I carried and surrender before my God as I learned whose I am again.

If it were up to me I would have kept going, but God knew He must take away if I wouldn't walk away. Tethered between my doubt and future my heart choked, swept away in a sea of questioning I found myself sitting on my bed beneath the purple window curtainsnot writing a book like I wanted to, like I should have but reading a love letter written for me.

If it were up to me I would have kept going, traveling farther expecting to not need to pull over to refill my gas tank in this marathon.

My desires, God's plan, learning to re-align them.

I forgave myself for wasting time because if it were up to me the stillness would never come.

But God whispered to me these past eight months; be still and surrender.

### Season of Racial Healing, Justice, and Reconciliation

"Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere."
- The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., Letter from the Birmingham Jail

I've always thought of my life as morally neutral, "average" in fact. I only saw racism in individual acts of cruelty and injustice, not in the invisible social systems that provide me with enormous advantages. Through the work the Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) is doing to address racial healing, justice, and reconciliation, I

have come to realize I'm undoubtedly the beneficiary of White privilege, the invisible package of unearned assets I can cash in each day that Peggy McIntosh so aptly describes in *White Privilege: Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack*:

- I can shop at Whole Foods, assured that I won't be followed or harassed.
- My children's textbooks testify to the existence of their race.
- I can excel in challenging situations without being called a credit to my race, a "compliment" my brilliant Black colleague recently received.

Sadly, the list goes on and I can only imagine how exhausting this reality must be, day after day, week after week, year after year. It would never occur to me to worry that someone I love might be stopped or even arrested for "driving while Black," a fate that has befallen beloved colleagues. I'm now face to face with my complicity in perpetuating a system that makes my friends of color struggle to feel the same sense of confidence and belonging I enjoy, and I long to right this wrong.

So...I invite my friends to share their experience of being Black in America, and I listen with an open heart. I'm learning all I can about the impact of racism on every aspect of life in America. I recently joined the Revs. Jane Hale, Rowena Kemp, Adam Thomas and Rachel Thomas on a pilgrimage to Alabama where we were immersed in the evolution of racism from slavery to racial terror lynchings, then to the cruel Jim Crow laws and now, extrajudicial killings and the mass incarceration of people of color. And I ask God to open our hearts and our minds to this sin and help us work together to create a more just world.

A Black priest I hold in the highest regard recently shared one of her dreams for the future in ECCT: That she will be able to apply for any open position and her fitness to serve will be based on her gifts as a priest rather than the color of her skin. I am committed to doing what I can to make that a reality and I hope you will join me in ECCT's fight for justice.
