Ordinary Time

“It’s not easy, being green” sings Kermit the Frog about the color of his skin, bemoaning the fact that because it’s such an ordinary color, people tend to pass you by. But he learns that it’s an ordinary color that is also the color of amazingly wonderful parts of creation. “It’s fine, and it’s what I want to be,” Kermit concludes.

This past Monday, May 24th, as we do every Monday after Pentecost Sunday, the church entered the green season, also known as “Ordinary Time,” the longest season of the church year. This season doesn’t end until the Saturday before the First Sunday in Advent. The altar and pulpit hangings are green during this season, as are the priest’s vestments, except on special Feast Days. If Kermit were an Episcopalian, I’m guessing that the Sundays after Pentecost would be his favorite season!

When we in the church say “Ordinary time,” it not only means regular or plain, but it has also come to mean counted, as in ordinal numbers. The Sundays of Ordinary Time are numbered. For instance, June 6th is the “Second Sunday after Pentecost,” and so on.

The Sundays after Pentecost are “ordinary” in another sense as well, because our scriptures focus on the

teachings of Jesus in his “ordinary” life and how we are to follow him in living ours. Since the First Sunday in Lent, we have been focusing on the life of Jesus: his death, resurrection, Ascension, and then concluding with the gift of the Holy Spirit into our lives at Pentecost.

With Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit, there is a huge change, because now the disciples of Jesus, and that’s us, are empowered to become the church. The Holy Spirit gives us the power to carry out the work of Jesus to love our neighbor. With the Holy Spirit, God actually dwells within us and gives us the strength and power we need to live life differently.

Because of what happened at Pentecost, life is now a union between God and people through the power of the Spirit, making the ordinary holy. Never again can we say, that “ordinary” means boring or plain. When we see with the eyes of God’s Spirit in us, and when we feel with the heart of God’s Spirit in us, and when we act with the power of God’s Spirit in us, the ordinary is transformed into a whole universe of possibility to love.

The "2 out of 3" Rule

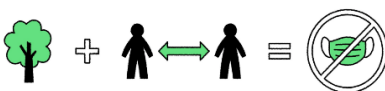
Recommended by the bishops, the "2-out-of-3 rule" requires

that in-person worship and gatherings meet two of the following three precautions: outside, masked, and six foot physical distance. For example, if worshipping outside and people maintain a six foot physical distance, then masks are not necessary. The "rule" here is to maintain at least 2 of the 3 levels of protection when gathering in-person.

Use the 2-out-of-3 Rule

In you're not vaccinated, make sure your activity meets two out of the following three conditions: outdoors, distanced and masked.

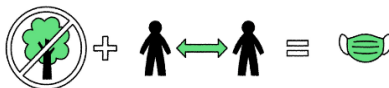
Outdoors + Distanced = No Mask Needed

Israel and Palestine

As you may be aware, the conflict and violence between Israel and Palestine has been increasing in the past few weeks. Presiding Bishop Michael Curry has issued the following statement:

One more time we awake to the news of violence. Reports come in, even as you read this, about violence that has caused death, life-changing injury and destruction of property and lives. Violence which is borne of frustration, rooted in injustice and the violation of international law and in truth, the violation of human rights and human decency. In the Name of the God of all creation, the violence must stop, regardless of where it comes from and to whom it is directed.

One more time The Episcopal Church stands to say that violence is not the way forward. We say the expansion of Israeli settlements at the expense of Palestinian families must end. We say incitement which encourages violence must end. We say enough is enough.

One more time The Episcopal Church encourages the government of the United States and others who have influence, who are of goodwill and who genuinely seek peace to be partners in peacemaking, to bring about a negotiated settlement to the long-standing conflict which has consumed both Israelis and Palestinians.

One more time we find ourselves full of sorrow and sadness. We find ourselves grieving over the loss of life, destruction of homes and the fear that lives in the hearts of tens of thousands of innocent people. We join all people of faith to offer up prayers for healing, wholeness, restoration and reconciliation.

And we pray God to grant wisdom and courage to all those in authority to seek peace and pursue it without delay, without excuses, without confusion and with only one agenda: a negotiated and equitable agreement for peace between Israelis and Palestinians – once and for all.



The American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem is an organization dedicated to caring for the vulnerable and displaced in the Middle East. They are currently taking donations for the Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza which is one of the only hospitals that has not been destroyed. You

ECCT Stories: Jerusalem PeaceBuilders

Rev. Nicholas Porter, priest canonically resident in ECCT wrote an article sharing his faith journey and the founding of Jerusalem PeaceBuilders (www.herusalempeacebuilders.org). Here is a short excerpt.

Founded in 2011, this ECCT ministry (JPB) launched its first program with 11 teens while today we operate year-round interfaith peace and leadership programs that unite and empower a new generation of Israelis, Palestinians, and Americans who are committed to building secure, shared and peaceful societies.

The story began in my mother's kitchen listening to Walter Cronkite narrate grainy black & white clips of the 1973 Yom Kippur War on CBS News. The images of Arab tanks, Israeli fighter-planes, and violent death changed my life.

I was only nine and living on a cattle farm in Missouri, but it was clear to me that that war was not the answer.

JPB's interfaith programs focus on breaking down isolation, polarization, prejudice, and stereotypes between Jews, Christians, Muslims, and Druze. Peace emerges as participants become active leaders whose lives exemplify a new narrative of achievement, trust, and healthy intercommunal relations.

We do this with a tiny cadre of staff and volunteers. On a good day, we can be likened to yeast leavening dough for a future much greater than ourselves. We are a "non-movement" of Jews, Christians, Muslims, and Druze working individually but simultaneously for peace, prosperity, and dignity in Jerusalem, Israel, and Palestine.

Is this not exactly how the Spirit of God silently shapes history and the human heart? We believe that God is a verb and this is our prayer for the peace of Jerusalem. We hope that you will join us in honoring God and transforming lives.
