Ukraine

While originally we had planned to run an Easter article here, we cannot ignore the conflict in Ukraine which is so devastating and weighs so heavily on our hearts.

As ECCT bishops Ian Douglas and Laura Ahrens say, we live in anxious and scary times. Vladimir Putin's unprovoked and evil war unleashed upon Ukraine is not only bringing death and destruction to the brave and resilient people of Ukraine, but also threatens the possibility of a global war between Western NATO aligned nations and Russia.

So instead here is an excerpt from the bishops of The Episcopal Church recent statement on the conflict.

We are gathered at a moment of profound jeopardy to the principles of international law and peace. There is a direct link between our baptismal covenant to respect the dignity of all people in Christ and the demand to respect the will of nations to determine their own destiny when

expressed freely through the ballot box.

We pray that the nations of the world call upon the Russian government to cease immediately this unjustifiable violence, especially against the innocent;

We pray that our siblings in the churches of Russia and Ukraine remind their leaders of Christ's commandment that we love our neighbors as we love ourselves — which we believe provides no justification for violent conflict unless in the defense of women, children, the elderly and those otherwise vulnerable;

And we pray that God protect and defend those who, with great courage, have stood and spoken against the choice for war in the counsels of their governments, their churches, and in the public square.

Updated COVID-19 Protocols

It is with guarded optimism that ECCT has reevaluated the precautions that we have faithfully followed over the last two years, The levels of infection in CT have not been at such a low level since early last summer, before the incidence of the Delta and Omicron variants.

Remember our decisions regarding COVID protocols should not be what we wish for ourselves, for our own comfort and desires, but an attempt to protect, as much as possible, the most vulnerable and at risk in our communities. Following the way of Jesus, who gave himself up as a self-offering for us and for all people, we must always act from a place of love and concern for the other in our midst.

We believe parishes can determine whether to require masks for worship and can even return to the common Communion Cup if desired as receiving from the shared chalice does not appear to cause an elevated risk. [Editor note: C&E will continue to use individual communion cups.] We do still recommend people continue to sit at a safe distance from one another and consider designating a zone that is set apart for people who choose to continue to be masked.

We would like to emphasize, once again, that the most

effective way for us to protect ourselves and our parishes and communities against COVID-19 is to become fully vaccinated and boosted. We encourage you to do all you can to encourage all eligible members of your parishes to be vaccinated to the furthest extent possible. We give thanks for your collegiality, faithfulness, and leadership in these challenging times.

The History Nook Audrey Sundwall

The Memorial Chapel

The Memorial Chapel is a good illustration of how elements of the three former parish buildings were incorporated to make a new whole. Items were combined, just as our congregations were joined to make a new parish. The chapel was designed in a Gothic motif, since both the Church of the Epiphany and Christ Church were furnished in that style.



As you look at the chapel, the reredos (the wood paneling covering the wall in back of the altar) and the altar itself came from Christ Church. It was handcarved in oak by Frederick M. Faeth of East Haven in 1931. The altar was given in memory of Charlotte Heermans, who had died while her husband, the Rev. Nile W. Heermans, was rector of Christ Church. The clergy chairs, the prie-dieux, and the baptismal font also came from Christ Church. The altar rail, kneelers, and altar appointments came from the Church of the Epiphany, and the cathedral chairs, kneelers, and the original organ came from Saint Mark's Mission.



The stained glass windows signify the three groups that became one. The three windows depict scenes from the Gospels. The window nearest the altar shows Christ the King, as the risen, victorious, reigning son of God, King of Kings, and Lord of Lords. It represents Christ Church.

The center window illustrates The Epiphany or Visit of the Magi, when the three Kings visited the infant Jesus and gave him gifts. This window represents The Church of The Epiphany.





The final window shows St. Mark the Evangelist, who holds in his hand a scroll of scripture revealing words from his Gospel. The lion stands for St. Mark's depiction of our Lord as the Lion of the tribe of Judah. This window represents St. Mark's Mission.

The Memorial Chapel is so named because it contains items which were given in memory of parishioners from Christ Church, The Church of The Epiphany, and St Mark's Mission. The names on those memorials are some of those who came before us who worked to create and uphold the Episcopal work of God and our Lord Jesus in our area. It was through them and the many other parishioners we remember, starting in 1789 with the organization of The Episcopal Society of East Haven, which became Christ Church; the establishment of a trust by Mrs. Betsy Forbes Bradley for the purpose of founding a church which, became The Church of The Epiphany in 1902; and the creation of a Sunday School in 1929 which became St. Mark's Mission in Momauguin, that the foundation of Christ and The Epiphany was possible.

The chapel remains a place where we honor those who have continued in the care and life of our parish. More recently a new memorial was added to the chapel in memory of Ron Swanson. The wood carving of Jesus as a carpenter was done by Ron's carving teacher and given in his memory by his wife Astrid and her family.




Celebrate Earth Day April 22
