In recognition of World Refugee Day and Episcopal Migration Ministries' Rainbow Initiative to support LGBTQ+ forced migrants, Presiding Bishop Michael Curry shared the following message:

Hello, I'm Michael Curry, presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church. June the 20th, as you may well know, is World Refugee Day. In thinking about that, I was particularly mindful this year of the passage found in the 25th chapter of Matthew's Gospel. It's where Jesus tells a parable, a story of judgment day, sometimes called the parable of the last judgment or the parable of the sheep and the goats.

When the Bible talks about judgment day in these kinds of context, it's really trying to get us to grasp what really matters, what is important to God. And in this parable, Jesus says all the nations and peoples of the earth are assembled before the king on judgment day. To those who have clothed those who were naked, fed those who were hungry, welcomed those who were strangers, visited those in prison or in hospital or alone, he says, enter into the joys of the kingdom. Enter into the joys of heaven.

But the righteous ones who are welcomed into heaven respond in the parable by saying, well, wait a minute, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or naked and clothe you, or alone and visited you? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you?

And Jesus says, when you did it to the least of these who are members of my family, you have done it unto me, the human family, the human family of God. And when we care for one another, respond to one another's needs, do what is just and kind and merciful and loving, we have done it unto God, God's self.

In the month of June and on June the 20th, we observe World Refugee Day, a day to remind us and to encourage us and for us to rededicate ourselves to the task of welcoming the stranger: those who are refugees fleeing persecution, those who are fleeing famine and natural disaster, those who are fleeing war, those who have lost their homes and everything that

they know and simply want to breathe free.

This year, we are also mindful that LGBTQ people in many countries are in additional danger. They are often threatened because of who they are, persecuted, and fleeing persecution. The Episcopal Church has made a commitment through Episcopal Migration Ministries to do what we can for all refugees that we can help. But in particular, for those LGBTQ forced migrants who simply, like the rest of us, just want to live in love and peace, as the Bible says, with everyone sitting under their own vine or fig tree.

The Rainbow Initiative is an initiative of Episcopal Migration Ministries, particularly to reach out to people in that situation. That's an additional commitment to our basic commitment to assist all refugees. And we do this work committed to the one named Jesus, who himself, with Mary and Joseph, was once a refugee.

As people helped the Holy Family to flee persecution, to find safety, so may we this year on World Refugee Day recommit our efforts and our commitments to do all that we can to welcome the stranger. Whereas you did it to the least of these who are members of my family, says Jesus, you have done it unto me.

God love you. God bless you. And may God hold us all in those almighty hands of love.

The collect for his feast day from the Church of England Lesser Feasts and Fasts reads:

Almighty God, by whose grace we celebrate again the feast of your servant Swithun: grant that, as he governed with gentleness the people committed to his care, so we, rejoicing in our Christian inheritance, may always seek to build up your Church in unity and love; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Ants are creatures of little strength, yet they store up their food in the summer. *Proverbs 30:25*


You have set all the borders of the earth; You have made summer and winter. Psalm 74:17

June Vestry Summary

Next Meeting - The next Vestry meeting will be Sunday, July 16th after the 9:00 a.m. service in the library and via Zoom.

Senior Warden - This month's Regional Wardens Zoom meeting had both our Senior and Junior Warden present and no other parishes. This gave us a good chance to chat with Rachel. St. James in New Haven appears to still be on track to close this coming December. Several parishioners attended Church of the Holy Spirit's 300th anniversary service to represent C&E.

Worship - Fr. Andrew will be our supply clergy every other week through the summer.

Building & Grounds - Screens have been put in the church windows by one of the Food Pantry volunteers.

All Emergency lighting has been checked and is in working order.

The painting of the parish hall upper windows is complete. The painter will be working on the side doors next and he has given us a quote of \$2,300 to do all the bottom windows of the parish hall.

A local business has cleaned all church gutters and fixed some leaking gutters on both the south side of the church and on 47 Park Place. Melanie said it was the first time there have been no leaks from the gutters since she's been at 47 Park Place!

Some general cleaning of the church is needed and volunteers would be greatly appreciated! Projects include cleaning windows, general cleaning, and rug shampooing.

The handicapped ramp is in desperate need of repair. If anyone knows of a contractor who might be able to give us a good price please let Barbara Parsons know.

Feast & Festivities - A parish summer picnic will be held on Sunday July 30 at the church after the service.

Communications

Committee - The first Junk in the Trunk sale went well. Also our table at the Old Stone Tag Sale was a success. In August the Communications Committee will be hosting a "Kindness Rocks" session where rocks will be painted in the North Lounge and a free will offering taken.

New Business - Diane Villano shared about the book *Invite*, *Welcome*, *Connect* which she recommends as good reading for the Vestry and all church members.



Reflections on the month of June Caela Collins

June is the month of magic, not the kind of magic that hides in the depths of a Mary Poppins carry-on or the depths of a black top hat. It's also not the kind of magic that's tucked underneath the cool side of a pillow, appreciating in value as the clock strikes midnight. June represents the kind of magic that can't be contained, the kind of mysterious wonder and awe that only God can comprehend fully. God speaks to everyone in their own unique way whether it be dance, or nature, or liturgy. However, one profound way God's magic emanates isn't that of songbird nannies, rabbits, or tooth fairies, it's in the stillness and silence of universal reminders to abundantly & unapologetically love our earthly siblings.

June's true magic is born through reminders, which hold the magical wisdom of God's word:

+ A reminder to accept one another as they are and where they are. (LGBTQIA+ Pride Month)

+ A reminder that our Black & Brown siblings in Christ are equals, not by emancipation, but by birthright. (Juneteenth)

+ A reminder to respond with compassion to those who mask their despair with anger, irritability, and bitterness. (PTSD Awareness Month)

+ A reminder to protect & prevent American children and teens from a man-made epidemic through programs like Swords to Plowshares. (Gun Violence Awareness Month)

+ A reminder that monetary success, material assets, and hierarchical titles can fly far away like Icarus [*Proverbs 23 4-5] but to keep core memories with loved ones extremely close to your heart and soul. (Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month) + A reminder that the word "home" isn't exclusive to tangible walls and curated designs inspired by the latest trend on HGTV; its wherever you have love, feel safe, are seen & welcomed. (Immigrant Heritage Month)

A final reminder that June enchants us with the need to help keep one another safe from the workplace to anyplace (National Safety Month).
