Stewardship: our faithful response to God's Generosity

Stewardship. God has given us memory, reason, and skill for the common good. If we would be faithful stewards of these gifts, skills, and resources we will mirror the incredible generosity of our God toward us as we engage the world around us.

In the book of Deuteronomy God states an expectation for the people of God, "If there is among you any in need, a member of your community in any of your towns within the land that the Lord God is giving you, . . . open your hand, willingly lending enough to meet the need whatever it may be." This expectation assumes awareness not only of our own needs, but also to the needs of others who, by God's design, belong to us.

God has given us a world and a land in which to live. He has given us abundant resources not for our possession (because they all belong to God and are on loan to us), but in order that through our stewardship, "the rich may not have too much and the poor may have enough," as St. Paul says. If we embrace the premise, that "we have Christ and possess nothing," then it becomes easier to release resources for God's purposes.

God gave freely to us. The skills, gifts and the position we hold in life have been granted us by the same self-giving God who loves to lavish good gifts on his children. In Philippians, Paul says, "my God shall supply all your needs according to his riches in glory." The Psalmist says, "he (God) owns the cattle on a thousand hills. the wealth in every mine." With such resources in God's control, it is not surprising that generations of Christians have found that they can not out give God.

In Scripture, generosity is not limited to the distribution of our wealth but also encompasses our engagement

with the creation and our fellow creatures. Does creation exist for my benefit alone or has God created it to be enjoyed by all his children in every generation? If the latter, this shapes how Christians must respond to our "fragile earth our island home."

We who love God are coming to understand that our true wealth is found in our relationship to God, a relationship that never perishes or rusts or becomes obsolete. Paul says, "O the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are his ways! . . . For from him and through him and in him are all things." Paul's great treasure was in knowing Christ. He spends all his resources (not merely the material resources of which he has little, but all

his skill wisdom and energy) to know God and to make God known. We receive the same invitation, to spend our lives for God and God's people.

Our Generosity of life is demonstrated through lives of gratefulness and joy in God's faithfulness. Paul in Philippians gives us some instruction on this matter. "Rejoice in the Lord, and again I say rejoice." In this, Paul invites us to see God's hand at work in our lives from the very beginning.

As generous servants of Christ we learn to "Have this mind in you that was also in Christ Jesus, who though in the form of God, did not consider equality with God as something to be held on to, but emptied himself taking upon himself the form of a servant." Paul understood that satisfying and lasting joy was found in setting aside all rights, prerogatives, and entitlements in order that he might be free to love the world to Christ.

God's generosity extends to God's creatures everywhere. In Christ we are learning this same openness and grace. As we affirm in our Baptismal Covenant we will "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves." We will strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being. We will live Paul's advice, "Whatsoever is true, honorable, just, pure, pleasing to God, and commendable, think on these things." This discipline of generosity lived in faithful stewardship to God will transform the world around us one person at a time.

May the generosity which has defined Christ's church in generations past deepen in us. May we be more intentional in the ways that we mirror Christ's generosity.

Interview with Treasurer Susan Shultz

Where does our money come from?

Most of our income comes from pledges. In 2022 pledges were 61% of our budget. The rest of our income comes from building rentals, the Thrift Store, Special Gifts and events (like the Christmas Fair). The stewardship letter will have some pie charts to give you a more detailed view.

Where does our money go?

The largest expenses we have are personnel (our Music Minister, Parish Administrator and Clergy - regular or supply). Most of the other significant expenses are related to the building - insurance, utilities, groundskeeping, and repairs. Finally, we have our 10% tithe to the CT Diocese.

Why is pledging important? Pledging is important because it is how we set a budget for the next year. Knowing how much we might expect in pledge income allows us to better determine what we need to do with other fundraising to meet our expenses. And it tells us how many expenses we can support. Also knowing when pledge income will come in (i.e. monthly/weekly/ quarterly), helps us track throughout the year to avoid any end of year surprises and adjust resources if we need to. Note that specific pledge information is treated as sensitive and is only visible to the Treasurer and Senior Warden. For everyone else, pledge income is anonymous

How do I pledge?

All parishioners will be mailed a Stewardship letter with an enclosed pledge card. Or you can pick one up at church in the Narthex (back of the church). Pray about your church family support. Then fill out the card. Note that the card contains volunteer opportunities for your time and talent as well. Bring your completed pledge card to church and put it in the plate on Sunday Nov 19. Or you can put it in the plate on any previous Sunday.

We write to you with sorrow and grief for the lives lost in the current conflict in Israel/Palestine, and we join in deepening our prayers for the people of the Holy Land. From our broken hearts, we offer our prayers to God. We offer to you a prayer from the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem (AFEDJ). ECCT has supported and walked with AFEDJ for many years. We also offer to you the prayer written by Archbishop Hosam Naoum of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. We invite you to pray with these words as individuals and to share with others as you feel so called.

Many of you may also be looking for life-giving ways to respond with a touch of hope and care. The Alhi Arab hospital in Gaza is in need of funds to support their ministry. This is one way we can provide this touch. We also encourage you to reach out to your friends and neighbors - building bridges, offering kindness, and locally living God's dream for connection in our world.

May God's love and peace fill the hearts and minds of all, bringing an end to the violence and moving us all toward peace.
