SHOUTING IN CHURCH

Maybe some of you know that in an email, text or Tweet, if you write in ALL CAPS, it means that you are SHOUTING. Usually, we Episcopalians like our worship nice and orderly. We aren't known for our spontaneous "Alleluias" or "Praise the Lords." And we certainly aren't known for shouting in church.

But if you look on page 363 in the Book of Common Prayer, you'll see that at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer the "AMEN" is in ALL CAPS. It is so important that it even has a name: *the Great Amen*. And those capital letters express a fundamental meaning of what we are doing when we say the Eucharistic Prayer. (BTW: every Eucharistic prayer has the Great Amen at the end, not just on page 363.)

The Eucharistic prayer isn't something to just passively listen to and think the priest is doing it all. The prayer is a call and response, a dialogue between the priest at the altar and the people in the pews.

So, what is so important about this Great Amen? While you may see the priest saying many of the words, it's the entire Eucharistic prayer (not just specific actions during it) that consecrates the bread and the wine. And here is why the Great Amen is so significant: it is through the role of the

entire congregation that the Holy Spirit effects consecration.

That moment when we say AMEN, is the moment when we express that the bread and wine are consecrated, and that the entire congregation has had a part in it. The theological importance of that AMEN emphasizes the profound role that the congregation has in assenting to the words the priest has said on behalf of the people.

A priest cannot celebrate the Eucharist alone. It's not possible without people. You may notice that in the bulletin we often call the priest who is at the altar on a particular Sunday the "Presider." The priest presides on behalf of the people, and the Great Amen (also known as "The People's Prayer) is the congregation's way of completing the Eucharistic prayer.

Amen is often translated as "let it be so." When we say AMEN at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer, we are not offering our AMEN as a sigh or some halfhearted token of thanks, we're blasting AMEN to God through a bullhorn of grace and hope that God has given us in Jesus.

The next time we celebrate the Eucharist and we come to

AMEN, remember that you are part of the consecration and

that it's not complete without your assent. And it's ok to shout in church! AMEN!

A message from the ECCT Reparations Task Force

Did you know? Work on reparations is not new. The first demands for reparations were made by enslaved people before the Civil War. Several Episcopal Dioceses have already taken up the work of reparations: Maryland, New York, and Massachusetts.

This is the Diocese of New York's definition for reparations:

Reparations is the process to remember, repair, restore, reconcile, and make amends for wrongs that can never be singularly reducible to monetary terms. The process of reparations is "a historical reckoning involving acknowledgement that an offense against humanity was committed and that the victims have not received justice."

Live Stream, In Person, Holy Space

A month ago, I met with our priest, the Rev. Adam Thomas, to learn how to run the internet software so that we can remain virtual even as our church moves back to in-person worship. Two weeks later, sitting next to the altar and hidden behind a TV screen, set to project the week's readers for the in-person congregation, I felt a little bit like the Wizard of Oz - take no notice of the little woman behind the screen. Over the last year, we have all adapted our way of being together and praying, but we have been together often, and we have prayed fervently, sorrowfully, joyfully and with one another. We have learned much.

As senior warden as the world locked down, I was first person to stand in for the congregation on-line, providing responses, reading the prayers and lessons. We had one camera, which we turned from one of us to the other. We soon shifted to YouTube Live opening the worship to all who wished to be there. With this and along with most of the churches in America, we brought the church out of the building into the homes of the people.

The longer the pandemic continued, the more the space in the building shifted and changed: plexi-glass, more cameras, a new computer monitor, then a TV screen and speaker were added; readers were enlisted, and most especially impressive, the choir and friends of the choir recorded the anthems each week - a task of electronic wizardry. We faced one another, each a face in a box with a name - what a blessing. Far away families joined us in worship and during the Zoom Coffee Hour. During these sessions, we all sat in each other's studios, living rooms, kitchens, and patios. These images became our holy space. But now we are back. Our first service back was emotional; we all choked up a little at that first Alleluia.

For two weeks now I have sat behind the computer screens. I look out over the TV to check out who is there, recognizing folks I have gotten to know online this past year. I read the chats as they appear during the service and let them know someone is sitting behind the screen and still listening. I have had the gift and privilege to have a front row seat behind the scenes to all this change. As we move the people back into the church, we continue in prayer together wherever we are, hoping that more people are listening to God's word in these holy spaces. Alleluia!

Notes: Although pledges continue to be slightly under budget and the 47 Park Place rent was late we still managed to be \$300 over the month's budget. Utilities & Grounds were under budget which balanced out with some Building Maintenance that went over the month budget (although YTD is on budget). We are now about \$5,000 under our annual budget and since that budget has a \$15,000 deficit all improvement is exciting!
