Episcopal Reception Susan Shultz

In June we will celebrate a wonderful event - the formal reception of Evelyn & Brad Conant and Anthony Reckart into The Episcopal Church.

You may ask - what does this really mean? Technically you are an Episcopalian by simply attending an Episcopal church and registering your baptism has happened. Most of us have probably never even thought about it.

The Episcopal Church defines Reception as a sacramental rite of Christian Commitment. Baptized persons who have been members of another Christian fellowship and wish to be affiliated with the Episcopal Church may make a public affirmation of their faith and commitment to the responsibilities of their baptism in the presence of a bishop. The bishop says, "We recognize you as a member of the one holy catholic and apostolic Church, and we receive you into the fellowship of this Communion".

While anyone from any denomination (or no denomination) is welcome and encouraged to become a member of Christ & The Epiphany at any time - being formally received can be a powerful and moving way to profess your adult commitment to your faith and faith community. Last year Melanie Miller, Paul Barrett and Mary-Claire Peach-Keyes had this special moment right here.

In our parish, every member's story is different. Some grew up in the Episcopal Church. Many have come to it from a different tradition. Some came because they married an Episcopalian. Some found the Episcopal Church as a "midway" point between Protestant and Roman Catholic practices. Some came from more evangelical traditions drawn by the openness and liturgy of the Episcopal Church. Many came from the Roman Catholic church, looking for a sacramental expression of Christianity that also values lay leadership, the ordination of women, and broader theological views. And some came because C&E just felt like a good fit, and denomination wasn't really part of the question.

Being formally received into the Episcopal Church does not at all mean that you need to leave everything that has formed your faith from other religious or Christian traditions at the door. All those things are important and have shaped you into the person you are today. It is, though, a recognition that now you are June 2025

Spring Training Report Susan Shultz

This year besides the online Spring Training sessions which a number of parishioners attended, Susan Shultz and Anthony Reckart attended the in-person Saturday Spring Training workshop day.

You may have heard how Anthony was this year's star as he attended almost ALL the workshops throughout the week. Bishop Jeff even presented him at the closing session with a "frequent flyer" award of an ECCT mug.



One of the most interesting sessions I attended was Expansive Welcome: Highlighting Non-Patriarchal Divine Images in Scripture in Order to Widen Our Welcome and Deepen Our Understanding of the Holy. (whew!)

This session talked about how we can expand our language to be more inclusive without necessarily "replacing" our traditions. It talked about how words matter and adding more non-gender and metaphorical images and language can increase our inclusivity.

We seek to maximize rather than erase language from our liturgical lexicon. Language matters. It shapes our sense of reality, and through it we forge and maintain our relationships with God and one another. Expansive language seeks to tell as much truth about God as we can, utilizing the full range of language available to us. It does not displace traditional language for God, but uses additional metaphors even as we recognize no human language can contain God.

I was especially surprised to be reminded of the number of female and maternal images of God there are in the bible. From the parable of the women who is looking for her lost coin (us) to verses like Isaiah 66:13 "As one whom his mother comforts, so will I comfort you; you shall be comforted in Jerusalem." We even saw a Roman church mosaic of God as a mother hen with us (her chicks) under her wings.

Encouraging Words for Ascension Day Audrey Sundwall

Jesus said to her, "Do not cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." -- John 20:17

After the Lord Jesus had spoken to them, he was taken up into heaven and he sat at the right hand of God. -- Mark 16:19

He was taken up before their very eyes, and a cloud hid him from their sight. They were looking intently up into the sky as He was going, when suddenly two men in white stood beside them. "Men of Galilee," they said, "why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven." -- Acts 1:9-11





My heart is heavy at the death of our brother in Christ, Pope Francis. Throughout his life and ministry, he has been a witness for the Gospel and a champion for the poor and marginalized. Especially in this season, I give thanks for his powerful advocacy on behalf of migrants and refugees. Pope Francis, who was the first Latin American pope, understood these siblings in Christ are never at the edges, fearful and alone. As he once wrote, "In the faces of the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the sick, strangers and prisoners, we are called to see the face of Christ who pleads with us to help." In 12 years as the Roman Catholic pontiff, Pope Francis transformed our theology of the environment and recognized the need for LGBTQ+ people to feel heard, seen, and included in their church. We are likewise grateful for his emphasis on reconciliation and ecumenical dialogue, in which our church has participated through the Anglican-Roman Catholic Theological Consultation in the United States of America. I thank God for the life of Pope Francis, and ask you to pray for him, for all who loved him, and for our Roman Catholic siblings in Christ. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.



On May 12, Presiding Bishop Sean Rowe sent out a letter regarding Episcopal Migration Ministries (EMM). In the letter he notes that the federal government informed EMM that due to their federal grant funding, they were expected to resettle white Afrikaners from South Africa, who the U.S. government had classified as refugees.

Bishop Rowe states in his letter, "in light of our church's steadfast commitment to racial iustice and reconciliation and our historic ties with the Anglican Church of Southern Africa, we are not able to take this step." He also expresses deep concern that in these actions by the federal government, one group of refugees is prioritized over others, especially those who have been waiting for years to enter the U.S. enduring harsh conditions and living in refugee camps. Given this turn of events, at the end of the federal fiscal year, The Episcopal Church will end its refugee resettlement grant agreements with the federal government.

We commend Bishop Rowe for his actions and support his decision. We continue to conduct our ministry as followers of Jesus Christ. We are again reminded of the words of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., "We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in

a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly."

We ask you to pray for, and work on behalf of, all refugees everywhere, individually and within your communities. We recommend to you the work of IRIS and EMM, who continue to partner with, and advocate for, refugees and immigrants within Connecticut and across the country.

Persevere in the good work that God has called you to do, proclaiming the Good News of the resurrection, living resurrection lives, and bearing witness to the places in our world in deep need of the New Life to which Christ calls us.

A Sonnet for Ascension Day Malcolm Guite

We saw his light break through the cloud of glory Whilst we were rooted still in time and place As earth became a part of Heaven's story And heaven opened to his human face. We saw him go and yet we were not parted The heart that broke for all the broken-hearted Is whole and Heaven-centered now, and sings, Sings in the strength that rises out of weakness, Sings through the clouds that veil him from our sight, Whilst we ourselves become his clouds of witness And sing the waning darkness into light, His light in us, and ours in him concealed, Which all creation waits to see revealed.



Recently, I enjoyed a wonderful book- *"The Heartbeat of God"*- by Katharine Jefferts Schori, the first female Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church (2006-2015). The focus of her book is finding the sacred in the middle of everything- creation, brokenness, public life, and margins.

On May 11th we celebrated Mother's Day, but it also was "Good Shepherd" Sunday. Her chapter "Good Shepherd" is based on the Scripture from John 10:14-15 - "I am the good shepherd, I know my sheep and my sheep know me - just as the Father knows me and I know the Father- and I lay down my life for the sheep." In this chapter she says the following:

"Shepherds in Jesus' day were essentially homeless. They didn't have any permanent place to lay their head at night. They spent their days and nights in the open, rarely bathed, carried sick sheep to safety, and probably dispatched the sickest. Each morning shepherds had to sort out their sheep and goats from the others who shared the open grazing land, and they had to take on various predators, both animal and human. The competing shepherds in common grazing lands had to be able to tell their sheep apart- each shepherd knew the sheep as individuals and had a distinctive call to gather his own, the sheep of that herd knew that call, and followed their own shepherd.

Many of the ancients thought of shepherds as thieves, probably because of confusion among the sheep on those common pastures. There was even a prohibition in Jewish law against buying wool and milk from shepherds, lest one unwittingly receive stolen goods. Shepherds weren't considered reliable as witnesses, and couldn't give testimony so why would anyone want to follow somebody like that? Why would Jesus call himself a shepherd? Maybe because this good shepherd Jesus hangs out with anybody and everybody, and joins the outcasts and the forgotten. This isn't sanitary Jesus, robed in Mr. Clean whites and looking saintly on an old stained-glass window. This is Hell's Angel Jesus on a Harley, rounding up toys for poor kids. This is gang leader Jesus, pushing his homeys to fill an old lady's grocery cart, and then haul it home for her and put the food away. This is a shepherd like Oscar Romero- the bishop of El Salvador who spoke out against injustice and was assassinated in 1980- challenging the government to remember those who are left out. This kind of shepherd comes in surprising guises, speaking in unfamiliar tongues, but leading us toward a society marked by welcome for all, where there's room at the table for people of every family, language, and nation. Jesus the good shepherd wipes away tears from every eye, finds shelter for all out of the scorching sun, waters them in the desert at the springs of the water of life, and feeds every single one on the borderless pasture planted and grown for all of God's beloved creatures, not just a privileged few. That's a shepherd worth following!" (pp. 114-115)
